1. EUROSTUDENT V Project activities in 2015

EUROSTUDENT V Final Conference in conjunction with PL4SD, 25 – 27 February in Vienna, Austria

From 25 to 27 February 2015 the joint final conference of the projects EUROSTUDENT and PL4SD took place in Vienna, Austria. Around 250 participants from all over Europe attended the conference and actively contributed to a peer learning process on the social dimension.

Before the official start of the conference, a EUROSTUDENT V wrapup session was organised to reflect on the fifth round of EUROSTUDENT, together with the Project Consortium and the national teams. The main purpose of the wrap-up session was to learn about countries' experiences of participating in EUROSTUDENT V and their suggestions for EUROSTUDENT VI. The national teams actively shared their experiences and challenges of participating in the project and their ideas for next round.

A completely new EUROSTUDENT V Database (Data Reporting Module) has been launched. It includes profiles on each of the EUROSTUDENT V participating countries as well as introductory remarks to each of the topics covered. The new version of the database allows compiling data for one or several countries for each of the covered topics and subtopics individually. 4. International and comparative statistics


EUROSTUDENT V 2012 – 2015 Synopsis of Indicators: Statistic on time budget of students by housing situation

Different factors may influence students' choices with regard to accommodation such as personal preferences, financial restrictions, and societal norms. The type of housing can be quite influential on the day-to-day organisation and experience of students. The figure below shows that the time budget of students living with parents varies from less than 40 hours per week in countries such as Finland, Sweden, Lithuania, or France, to more than 60 hours per week in Armenia and Poland.






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In almost all of the EUROSTUDENT countries, the weekly time budget of students not living with their parents is higher compared to their peers living with parents. In half of the EUROSTUDENT countries, students living at home spend a marginally higher time on taught studies compared to students not living at home. In the majority of the EUROSTUDENT countries, students not living with parents spend more time on personal studies than students living with parents. However, this difference is marginal and fluctuates between one hour and four hours per week.
